## **HUMAN ERA:**

Sometime in the future, we begin with our main character Irene Fielding, and her husband Roland Hooper as they pack luggages in their lavish, high-tech mansion. In the background, on a giant television, there's a news broadcast explaining the current state of the world. One that has limited resources; that what is left will be provided only to those who pay top-dollar to live in fancy towers designed by a corporate politician named Kessler. It is revealed that tonight is the final night that the city has widespread power. Irene's husband informs her that she cannot join him in receiving a military escort to the new towers because of payment issues.
